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BNNB Statement

October 2nd 2024 - Lusaka

Addressing the High Cost-of-Living through Inclusive Socio-Economic Policies

The Jesuit Centre for Theological Reflection (JCTR) has recorded a reduction in the Basic Needs and Nutrition Basket (BNNB), which stood at K10, 478.04 during the month of September, reflecting a K191.29 reduction compared to the month of August 2024 in Lusaka. The analysis revealed that the reduction was driven by a decrease in the prices of several commodities. Kapenta, for instance, dropped from K407.51 per kg in August to K336.84 per kg in September. Similarly, the price of a 40kg bag of vegetables fell from K641.26 in August to K546.16 in September 2024, while the cost of charcoal declined from K402.67 in August to K376.67 in September 2024. However, **compared to September 2023, the Basic Needs and Nutrition Basket (BNNB) has risen by K1,331.98**, even as incomes remain stagnant and economic activities continue to be suppressed due to the ongoing energy crisis.

Furthermore, the Centre has observed a significant increase in prices of most food items in 2024. This requires attention from policy makers as it has implications on the food and nutritional security of many households in Zambia.

The high cost of living is primarily influenced by low food production on the supply side, a result of drought conditions, and by the economic slowdown on the demand side, driven by factors such as the ongoing energy crisis. In response, the Jesuit Centre for Theological Reflection recommends the following:

• The Ministries of Community Development and Social Services, with the support of the Ministry of Finance and National Planning, along with Cooperating Partners, should

reintroduce or scale up the implementation of price shock-responsive social protection

packages, particularly in urban areas.

• The Ministry of SMEs, Agriculture, and Local Government and Rural Development should

enhance the participation of cooperatives in food production and manufacturing, focusing on

regions with favourable rainfall patterns and food security.

• The Ministry of Agriculture and the Ministry of Transport and Logistics must ensure the timely

delivery of farming inputs to farmers across all districts for the 2024/25 farming season.

• In the medium term, the Ministry of Labour and Social Security should consider revising the

minimum wage to align with the rising cost of living.

• The Ministry of Finance and National Planning, in collaboration with relevant agencies, should

review the overall tax and non-tax system, with an emphasis on incentivising local businesses

in key sectors such as agriculture and manufacturing, which produce essential goods. Tax

incentives could boost production, reduce costs, and promote job creation.

• The government, through the Bank of Zambia, should focus on stabilising inflation by

adjusting interest rates and managing market liquidity to curb inflationary pressures, address

the rising cost of living, and mitigate the depreciation of the Kwacha.

It is clear that the challenges that lie ahead are significant. However, the government must remain

resolute in pursuit of the most inclusive solutions and guarantee that every Zambian leads a life of

dignity.
